

Touching the internal parts of the camera or Charging AC Adapter could result in injury. Repairs should be performed only by qualified technicians. Should the camera or Charging AC Adapter break open as the result of a fall or other accident, take the product to a Nikon-authorized service representative for inspection, after unplugging the product and/or removing the battery.

Do not use the camera or Charging AC Adapter in the presence of flammable gas

Do not use electronic equipment in the presence of flammable gas, as this could result in explosion or fire.

\Lambda Handle the camera strap with care

Never place the strap around the neck of an infant or child.

Particular care should be taken to prevent infants from putting the battery or other small parts into their mouths.

Do not remain in contact with the camera, battery charger, or AC adapter for extended periods while the devices are on or in use

Parts of the devices become hot. Leaving the devices in direct contact with the skin for extended periods may result in lowtemperature burns.

Do not leave the product where it will be exposed to extremely high temperatures, such as in an enclosed automobile or in direct sunlight

Observe caution when handling the battery

The battery may leak, overheat or explode if improperly handled. Observe the following precautions when handling the battery for use in this product:

- Before replacing the battery, turn the product off. If you are using the Charging AC Adapter/AC adapter, be sure it is unplugged.
- Use only a Rechargeable Li-ion Battery EN-EL19 (included). Charge the battery by using a camera that supports battery charging. To perform this operation, use either Charging AC Adapter EH-70P (included) or the **Charge by computer** function. The Battery Charger MH-66 (available separately) is also available to charge the battery without using a camera.

- When inserting the battery, do not attempt to insert it upside down or backwards.
- Do not short or disassemble the battery or attempt to remove or break the battery insulation or casing.
- Do not expose the battery to flame or to excessive heat.
- Do not immerse in or expose to water.
- Put the battery in a plastic bag, etc. in order to insulate it before transporting. Do not transport or store with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- The battery is prone to leakage when fully discharged. To avoid damage to the product, be sure to remove the battery when no charge remains.
- Discontinue use immediately should you notice any change in the battery, such as discoloration or deformation.
- If liquid from the damaged battery comes in contact with clothing or skin, rinse immediately with plenty of water.

▲ Observe the following precautions when handling the Charging AC Adapter

- Keep dry. Failure to observe this precaution could result in fire or electric shock.
- Dust on or near the metal parts of the plug should be removed with a dry cloth. Continued use could result in fire.



Attaching the Camera Strap








Using Menus (the MENU Button)

Setting Menu Options


- Certain menu options cannot be set depending on the current shooting mode or the state of the camera. Unavailable options are displayed in gray and cannot be selected.

The Monitor

The information that is displayed in the monitor during shooting and playback changes depending on the camera's settings and state of use.

By default, information is displayed when the camera is turned on and when you operate the camera, and turns off after a few seconds (when **Photo info** is set to **Auto info** in **Monitor settings** (\square 73)).





The Basics of Shooting and Playback

Preparation 1 Insert the Battery

1 Open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.



2 Insert the battery.

- Push the orange battery latch in the direction indicated by the arrow ((1)), and fully insert the battery ((2)).
- The battery locks into place when inserted correctly.



Be Careful to Insert the Battery in Correct Direction

Inserting the battery upside down or backwards could damage the camera.



3 Close the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.

Removing the Battery

Turn the camera off and make sure that the power-on lamp and monitor have turned off, and then open the batterychamber/memory card slot cover.

Move the battery latch in the direction indicated by the arrow (1) to eject the battery (2).

High Temperature Caution

The camera, battery, and memory card may be hot immediately after using the camera.

Preparation 2 Charge the Battery


1 Prepare the included Charging AC Adapter.

- If a plug adapter* is included with your camera, attach the plug adapter to the plug on the Charging AC Adapter. Push the plug adapter firmly until it is securely held in place. Once the two are connected, attempting to forcibly remove the plug adapter could damage the product.
 - * The shape of the plug adapter varies according to the country or region in which the camera was purchased. This step can be omitted if the plug adapter comes permanently bonded to the Charging AC Adapter.

2 Make sure the battery is installed in the camera, and then connect the camera to the Charging AC Adapter in order of (1) to (3).

- Keep the camera turned off.
- Make sure that the plugs are properly oriented. Do not insert or remove the plugs at an
 angle when connecting or disconnecting them.

Charge lamp



- The charge lamp slowly flashes green to indicate that the battery is charging.
- Shooting is not possible while the camera is connected to the Charging AC Adapter.

Charge lamp	Description
Flashes slowly (green)	The battery is charging.
Off	When charging is complete, the charge lamp stops flashing green and turns off. About 3 hours are required to charge a fully exhausted battery.
Flashes quickly (green)	 The ambient temperature is not suited to charging. Charge the battery indoors with an ambient temperature of 5°C to 35°C (41°F to 95°F). The USB cable or Charging AC Adapter is not properly connected, or there is a problem with the battery. Disconnect the USB cable or unplug the Charging AC Adapter and correctly connect it again, or change the battery.

3 Disconnect the Charging AC Adapter from the electrical outlet and then disconnect the USB cable.

Charging Using a Computer or Battery Charger

- You can also charge the battery by connecting the camera to a computer (274, 🖚70).
- You can use the Battery Charger MH-66 (available separately; 🖚 79) to charge the battery without using the camera.

Preparation 3 Insert a Memory Card

1 Turn off the camera and open the batterychamber/memory card slot cover.


2 Insert the memory card.


• Slide the memory card in until it clicks into place.

Be Careful to Insert the Memory Card in Correct Direction

Inserting the memory card upside down or backwards could damage the camera and memory card.

Close the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.








Formatting a Memory Card

The first time you insert a memory card that has been used in another device into this camera, make sure to format it with this camera. Insert the memory card into the camera, press the **NENU** button, and select **Format card** in the setup menu.

Removing the Memory Card

Turn the camera off and make sure that the power-on lamp and monitor have turned off, and then open the batterychamber/memory card slot cover.

Gently push the memory card into the camera (1) to partially eject the card (2).



High Temperature Caution

The camera, battery, and memory card may be hot immediately after using the camera.

Internal Memory and Memory Cards

Camera data, including images and movies, can be saved either in the camera's internal memory or on a memory card. To use the camera's internal memory, first remove the memory card.

Preparation 4 Setting the Display Language, Date, and Time

When the camera is turned on for the first time, the language-selection screen and the date and time setting screen for the camera clock are displayed.

- If you exit without setting the date and time, will flash when the shooting screen is displayed.
- - 3 Select Yes and press the 🛞 button.



4 Select your home time zone and press the 🕫 button.

 To enable davlight saving time, press A. When the daylight saving time function is enabled. So is displayed above the map. To disable the davlight saving time function, press $\mathbf{\nabla}$.

5 Select the date format and press the 🕅 button

6 Set the date and time, and press the **®** button

- Select a field: Press ◀► (changes between **D**, **M**, **Y**, hour, and minute).
- Edit the date and time: Press ▲▼.
- Confirm the settings: Select the minute field and press the (R) button.

Select **Yes** and press the **(R)** button.

· When settings are finished, the lens extends and the camera switches to shooting mode.











Changing the Language or the Date and Time Setting

- You can change these settings using the **Language** and **Time zone and date** settings in the **Y** setup menu (CT73).
- You can enable or disable daylight saving time in the **Ŷ** setup menu by selecting **Time zone and date** followed by **Time zone**. Press the multi selector **▶** and then **▲** to enable daylight saving time and move the clock forward one hour, or **▼** to disable daylight saving time and move the clock back one hour.

The Clock Battery

- The camera's clock is powered by a built-in backup battery. The backup battery charges when the main battery is inserted into the camera or when the camera is connected to an optional AC adapter, and it can run the clock for several days after about ten hours of charging.
- If the camera's backup battery becomes exhausted, the date and time setting screen is displayed when the camera is turned on. Set the date and time again. See step 3 ([116] 16) of "Preparation 4 Setting the Display Language, Date, and Time" for more information.

Imprinting the Shooting Date on Printed Images


- You can permanently imprint the shooting date on images as they are captured by setting Print date in the setup menu (
 73).
- You can use the ViewNX 2 software (¹¹⁷⁷) to print the shooting date on images that were captured without using the **Print date** option.





 - Press the power switch, shutter-release button, (c) (shooting mode) button, (c) (playback) button, or (* movie-record) button.



Step 3 Frame a Picture

1 Hold the camera steady.

- Keep fingers and other objects away from the lens, flash, AF assist-illuminator, microphone, and speaker.
- When taking pictures in portrait ("tall") orientation, turn the camera so that the flash is above the lens.





2 Frame the picture.

• When the camera automatically determines the scene mode, the shooting mode icon changes (\$\box\$32).

🚺 Notes About 🍱 (Scene Auto Selector) Mode

- Depending upon shooting conditions, the camera may not select the desired scene mode. In this case, select another shooting mode (232, 38, 40, 42).
- When the digital zoom is in effect, the scene mode changes to 🔤.

When Using a Tripod

We recommend using a tripod to stabilize the camera in the following situations:

- When shooting in dim lighting
- When shooting with the flash mode (\square 46) set to 3 (off)
- When using the telephoto setting

Using the Zoom

When you move the zoom control, the zoom lens position changes.


- To zoom in closer to the subject: Move toward **T** (telephoto).
- To zoom out and view a larger area: Move toward W (wideangle).

When you turn the camera on, the zoom moves to the maximum wide-angle position.

- A zoom indicator is displayed at the top of the monitor when the zoom control is moved.
- Digital zoom, which allows you to further magnify the subject up to approximately 4x the maximum optical zoom ratio, can be activated by moving and holding the zoom control toward **T** when the camera is zoomed in to the maximum optical zoom position.

Digital Zoom and Interpolation

While using digital zoom, the image quality decreases due to interpolation when the zoom is increased beyond the Δ position. The position of Δ moves to the right as the size of an image decreases.





Step 4 Focus and Shoot

1 Press the shutter-release button halfway.

- When the subject is in focus, the focus area glows green (multiple focus areas can glow green).
- When you are using digital zoom, the camera focuses in the center of the frame and the focus area is not displayed. When the camera has focused, the focus indicator (\$\box\$7] glows green.
- If the focus area or focus indicator flashes, the camera is unable to focus. Modify the composition and try pressing the shutterrelease button halfway again.





2 Without lifting your finger, press the shutterrelease button the rest of the way down.



The Shutter-release Button

Press halfway	To set focus and exposure (shutter speed and aperture value), press the shutter-release button lightly until you feel a slight resistance. Focus and exposure remain locked while the shutter- release button is pressed halfway.
Press all the way	Press the shutter-release button all the way to release the shutter and take an image. Do not use force when pressing the shutter-release button, as this may result in camera shake and blurred images. Press the button gently.

Notes About Saving Images and Recording Movies

The indicator showing the number of exposures remaining or the indicator showing the maximum movie length flashes while images are being saved or while a movie is being recorded. **Do not open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover or remove the battery or memory card** while an indicator is flashing. Doing this could result in loss of data, or in damage to the camera or the memory card.

Step 5 Play Back Images

1 Press the 🕨 (playback) button.

 If you press and hold down the (playback) button while the camera is turned off, the camera turns on in playback mode.



2 Use the multi selector to select an image to display.







Displaying a Description of Each Scene Mode (Help Display)

Select a scene and move the zoom control (\square 1) toward **T** (O) to view a description of that scene. To return to the original screen, move the zoom control toward **T** (O) again.



Tips and Notes

💐 Sports

- While the shutter-release button is held all the way down, the camera shoots up to about 6 images continuously at a rate of about 1.1 fps (when image mode is set to 200).
- The frame rate for continuous shooting may vary depending on the current image mode setting, the memory card used, or shooting conditions.
- Focus, exposure, and hue are fixed at the values determined with the first image in each series.

X Party/indoor

• To avoid the effects of camera shake, hold the camera steady. In dark surroundings, the use of a tripod is recommended.

🖬 Night landscape

- A Hand-held (default setting): Select this option to produce shots with reduced blurring and noise even when the camera is hand-held.
- Tripod: Select this option when using a tripod or other means to stabilize the camera when shooting.

🗱 Close-up

- Macro mode (149) is enabled and the camera automatically zooms to the closest position at which it can focus.
- You can move the focus area. Press the
 [®] button, use the multi selector ▲▼◀▶ to move the focus area, and press the [®] button to apply the setting.

¶Food

- Macro mode (CC 49) is enabled and the camera automatically zooms to the closest position at which it can focus.
- You can adjust hue by using the multi selector ▲▼. The hue setting is saved in the camera's memory even after the camera is turned off.
- You can move the focus area. Press the 𝔅 button, use the multi selector ▲▼◀▶ to move the focus area, and press the 𝔅 button to apply the setting.


- When you point the camera at a dog or cat, the camera detects the pet's face and focuses on it. By default, the camera detects a dog or cat face and automatically releases the shutter (pet portrait auto release).

 - S Single: The camera captures one image when a dog or cat face is detected.
 - Continuous: The camera captures three images continuously when a dog or cat face is detected.

V Pet Portrait Auto Release

- Press the multi selector ◀ (ⓒ) to change the **Pet portrait auto release** setting.
 - 📓: The camera detects a dog or cat face and automatically releases the shutter.
 - **OFF**: The camera does not release the shutter automatically, even if a dog or cat face is detected. Press the shutter-release button. The camera also detects human faces when **OFF** is selected.
- Pet portrait auto release is set to OFF after five bursts have been taken.
- Shooting is also possible by pressing the shutter-release button, regardless of the Pet portrait auto release setting. When U Continuous is selected, you can take images continuously while holding down the shutter-release button all the way.

Focus Area

- When the camera detects a face, the face is displayed inside a yellow border. When the camera acquires focus on a face displayed inside a double border (focus area), the double border turns green. If no faces are detected, the camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame.
- Under some shooting conditions, the pet face may not be detected and other subjects may be displayed inside a border.

When the camera detects a smiling face, you can take an image automatically without pressing the shutter-release button (smile timer (\square 55)). You can use the skin softening option to smooth the skin tones of human faces.

Enter shooting mode → 🖸 (shooting mode) button → 😇 Smart portrait → 🛞 button

1 Frame the picture.

- Point the camera at a human face.
- **2** Without pressing the shutter-release button, wait for the subject to smile.
 - If the camera detects that the face framed by the double border is smiling, the shutter is automatically released.
 - Whenever the camera detects a smiling face, it automatically releases the shutter.

3 End automatic shooting.

- Perform one of the operations listed below to end shooting.
 - Set Smile timer to Off.
 - Press the 🖸 button and select a different shooting mode.

Notes About Smart Portrait Mode

Under some shooting conditions, the camera may be unable to detect faces or smiles (¹⁵⁸). The shutter-release button can also be used for shooting.

When the Self-timer Lamp Flashes

When using smile timer, the self-timer lamp flashes when the camera detects a face and flashes quickly immediately after the shutter is released.



Using the Flash

You can select a flash mode to match the shooting conditions.



- The status of the flash can be confirmed by pressing the shutterrelease button halfway.
 - On: The flash fires when you press the shutter-release button all the way down.
 - Flashing: The flash is charging. The camera cannot shoot images.
 - Off: The flash does not fire when an image is taken.
- If the battery level is low, the monitor turns off while the flash is charging.

🖉 Red-eye Reduction

If the camera detects red eye while saving an image, the affected area is processed to reduce red-eye before the image is saved.

Note the following when shooting:

- More time than usual is required to save images.
- Red-eye reduction may not produce the desired results in some situations.
- In some rare cases, red-eye reduction may be applied unnecessarily to other areas of the image. In these cases, select another flash mode and take the image again.

Using the Self-timer

The camera is equipped with a self-timer that releases the shutter about ten seconds or two seconds after you press the shutter-release button.







The flash may be unable to light the entire subject at distances of less than 50 cm (1 ft 8 in.).

Focusing

The focus area varies depending on the shooting mode.

Using Face Detection

When the camera is pointed at a human face in the shooting modes as shown below, the camera automatically detects the face and focuses on it.

When the camera detects more than one face, the double border (focus area) is displayed around the face that is focused on, and single borders around the others.

If the shutter button is pressed halfway when no faces are detected:

- When 🖼 (scene auto selector) mode is selected, the focus area changes depending on the scene.
- In **Portrait** and **Night portrait** scene modes or in smart portrait mode, the camera focuses in the center of the frame.
- In a (auto) mode, the camera selects the focus area containing the subject closest to the camera.

Notes About Face Detection

- The camera's ability to detect faces depends on a variety of factors, including the direction in which the faces are looking.
- The camera may be unable to detect faces in the following situations:
 - When faces are partially hidden by sunglasses or otherwise obstructed
 - When faces take up too much or too little of the frame

Using Skin Softening

When the shutter is released while using one of the shooting modes listed below, the camera detects human faces and processes the image to soften facial skin tones (up to three faces).

Editing functions such as **Skin softening** can be applied to saved images by using **Glamour retouch** (\square 65) even after shooting.


Notes About Skin Softening

- It may take more time than usual to save images after shooting.
- Under some shooting conditions, the desired skin softening results may not be achieved, and skin softening may be applied to areas of the image where there are no faces.


Using Target Finding AF

When **AF area mode** (¹⁵⁴) in **1** (auto) mode is set to **Target finding AF**, the camera focuses in the manner described below when you press the shutter-release button halfway.

• The camera detects the main subject and focuses on it. When the subject is in focus, the focus area glows green. If a human face is detected, the camera automatically sets focus priority on it.

Focus areas

If no main subject is detected, the camera automatically selects one or more of the nine focus areas containing the subject closest to the camera. When the subject is in focus, the focus areas that are in focus glow green.

Notes About Target Finding AF

- Depending on shooting conditions, the subject that the camera determines to be the main subject may vary.
- The main subject may not be detected when using certain White balance settings.
- The camera may not detect the main subject appropriately in the following situations:
 - When the subject is very dark or bright
 - When the main subject lacks clearly defined colors
 - When the shot is framed so that the main subject is at the edge of the monitor
 - When the main subject is composed of a repeating pattern

Subjects Not Suitable for Autofocus

The camera may not focus as expected in the following situations. In some rare cases, the subject may not be in focus despite the fact that the focus area or the focus indicator glows green:

- Subject is very dark
- Objects of sharply differing brightness are included in the scene (e.g. the sun behind the subject makes that subject appear very dark)
- No contrast between the subject and surroundings (e.g. a portrait subject wearing a white shirt is standing in front of a white wall)
- Several objects are at different distances from the camera (e.g. the subject is inside a cage)
- Subjects with repeating patterns (window blinds, buildings with multiple rows of similarly shaped windows, etc.)
- Subject is moving rapidly

In the situations noted above, try pressing the shutter-release button halfway to refocus several times, or focus on another subject positioned at the same distance from the camera as the actual desired subject, and use focus lock (\square 62).

Focus Lock

Focus lock shooting is recommended when the camera does not activate the focus area that contains the desired subject.

1 Set AF area mode to Center in 🖸 (auto) mode (🛄 54).

- **2** Position the subject in the center of the frame and press the shutter-release button halfway.
 - The camera focuses on the subject and the focus area glows green.
 - Focus and exposure are locked.
- **3** Without lifting your finger, recompose the picture.
 - Make sure to maintain the same distance between the camera and the subject.
- **4** Press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down to take the picture.

Playback Zoom

Moving the zoom control toward $\mathbf{T}(\mathbf{Q})$ in full-frame playback mode ($\mathbf{\square}28$) zooms in on the image.

- You can change the zoom ratio by moving the zoom control toward $\mathbf{W}(\mathbf{E})$ or $\mathbf{T}(\mathbf{Q})$.
- To view a different area of the image, press the multi selector $\blacktriangle \nabla \blacklozenge$.
- If you are viewing an image that was captured using face detection or pet detection, the camera zooms in on the face detected at the time of shooting, except for images captured with Continuous, BSS, Multi-shot 16, or Subject tracking. To zoom in on an area of the image where there are no faces, change the zoom ratio and then, press $\triangle \nabla \blacklozenge$.
- When a zoomed image is displayed, press the 🕅 button to return to full-frame playback mode.

Cropping Images

When a zoomed image is displayed, you can press the **MENU** button to crop the image to include only the visible portion and save it as a separate file (🕶 18).

Thumbnail Playback/Calendar Display

Moving the zoom control toward \mathbf{W} (\mathbf{E}) in full-frame playback mode (\mathbf{m} 28) displays images as thumbnails.



- You can change the number of thumbnails displayed by moving the zoom control toward W ()
 (P).
- While using calendar display mode, press ▲▼◀► to select a date and then press the
 button to display the image captured on that day.

Notes About Calendar Display

Images captured when the camera's date is not set are treated as images captured on January 1, 2014.

Recording and Playing Back Movies

Recording Movies

1 Display the shooting screen.

- Check the remaining amount of movie recording time.
- When the Photo info option in Monitor settings (^{[[]}73) in the setup menu is set to Movie frame+auto info, the area that will be visible in the movie can be confirmed before movie recording starts.
- When Electronic VR (¹⁷³) in the setup menu is set to Auto, electronic vibration reduction is enabled and camera shake is reduced.

2 Press the ● (*\mathbf{m} movie-record) button to start movie recording.

• The camera focuses in the center of the frame.

3 Press the ● (* movie-record) button again to end recording.

Maximum Movie Length

Individual movie files cannot exceed 2 GB in size or 29 minutes in length, even when there is sufficient free space on the memory card for longer recording.

- The maximum movie length for a single movie is displayed on the shooting screen.
- Recording may end before either limit is reached if camera temperature becomes elevated.
- The actual movie length may vary depending on the movie content, subject movement, or type of memory card.

Notes About Saving Images and Recording Movies

The indicator showing the number of exposures remaining or the indicator showing the maximum movie length flashes while images are being saved or while a movie is being recorded. **Do not open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover or remove the battery or memory card** while an indicator is flashing. Doing this could result in loss of data, or in damage to the camera or the memory card.

Notes About Movie Recording

- Memory cards with an SD Speed Class rating of 6 or faster are recommended when recording movies (20). Movie recording may stop unexpectedly when memory cards with a lower Speed Class ratings are used.
- When recording movies with 220 m 720/30p/220 m 720/25p selected for Movie options, the angle of view (the area captured in the recorded movie) is smaller than when taking still images.
- When **Electronic VR** (¹)⁷³) is set to **Auto** in the setup menu, the angle of view (the area captured in the recorded movie) is smaller than when taking still images.
- Optical zoom cannot be adjusted once movie recording begins.
- There may be some degradation in image quality when digital zoom is used. Subjects can be magnified up to 4x the digital zoom ratio that was applied before movie recording began.
- The sounds of zoom control operation, autofocus lens drive movement, and aperture operation when brightness changes may be recorded.
- Smear (3) visible in the monitor with movie recording will be recorded with movies. Avoiding bright objects such as the sun, reflections of the sun, and electric lights when recording movies is recommended.

Depending on the distance to the subject or the amount of zoom applied, subjects with repeating
patterns (fabrics, lattice windows, etc.) may have colored stripes (interference patterns, moire, etc.)
in them during movie recording and playback. This occurs when the pattern in the subject and the
layout of the image sensor interfere with each other; it is not a malfunction.

Notes About Camera Temperature

- The camera may become hot when shooting movies for an extended period of time or when the camera is used in a hot area.
- If the inside of the camera becomes extremely hot when recording movies, the camera will automatically stop recording.

The amount of time remaining until the camera stops recording (@10s) is displayed. After the camera stops recording, it turns itself off.

Leave the camera off until the inside of the camera has cooled.

Notes About Autofocus for Movie Recording

Autofocus may not perform as expected (DG1). Should this occur, try the following:

- 1. Set **Autofocus mode** in the movie menu to **Single AF** (default setting) before starting movie recording.
- Frame another subject (positioned at the same distance from the camera as the intended subject) in the center of the frame, press the ● (* movie-record) button to start recording, and modify the composition.



Connection Methods

You can enhance your enjoyment of images and movies by connecting the camera to a TV, computer, or printer.



- Before connecting the camera to an external device, make sure the remaining battery level is sufficient and turn the camera off. Before disconnecting, make sure to turn the camera off.
- If the AC Adapter EH-62G (available separately) is used, this camera can be powered from an electrical outlet. Do not use any other make or model of AC adapter as it may cause the camera to heat up or malfunction.
- For information about the connection methods and subsequent operations, refer to the documentation included with the device in addition to this document.



Images and movies captured with the camera can be viewed on a TV. Connection method: Connect the video and audio plugs of an optional audio video cable to the TV's input jacks.

Viewing and organizing images on a computer



You can transfer images to a computer to perform simple retouching and manage image data.

Connection method: Connect the camera to the computer's USB port with the USB cable.

- Before connecting to a computer, install ViewNX 2 on the computer (\$\$\mathbb{M}\$77).
- If any USB devices that draw the power from the computer are connected, disconnect them from the computer before you connect the camera to it. Connecting the camera and other USB-powered devices to the same computer simultaneously may cause a camera malfunction or excessive power supply from the computer, which could damage the camera or memory card.



Using Panorama Assist

Use a tripod for the best results.

Enter shooting mode $\rightarrow \Box$ (shooting mode) button $\rightarrow \mathbb{Z}$ (second icon from the top*) $\rightarrow \triangleright \rightarrow \land \bigtriangledown \rightarrow \Box$ (Panorama assist) $\rightarrow \textcircled{}$ button

- * The icon for the last scene mode selected is displayed.
- 1 Use the multi selector ▲▼◀► to select the direction in which images are joined, and press the 𝔅 button.
 - If necessary, apply flash mode (¹⁴⁵), self-timer (¹⁴⁷), macro mode (¹⁴⁹) and exposure compensation (¹⁵⁰) settings in this step.
 - Press the 🛞 button to reselect the direction.



2 Frame the first portion of the panorama scene and take the first picture.

- The camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame.

- Images cannot be deleted while shooting in panorama assist mode. When shooting a new image, return to step 1 and start over again.

In panorama assist scene mode, exposure, white balance, and focus for all images in a panorama are fixed at the values for the first image in each series.

When the first image is taken, AE/AF-L is displayed to indicate that exposure, white balance, and focus are locked.





Panorama Creation with Panorama Maker

Transfer images to a computer (280) and use Panorama Maker to join them in a single panorama.

Favorite Pictures Mode

By adding images (except movies) to albums as favorite pictures, you can play back only the added images.

- Images can be sorted into nine albums. Up to 200 images can be added to each album.

Notes About Glamour Retouch







If the PictBridge startup screen is not displayed after the camera is turned on, turn the camera off and disconnect the USB cable. Set **Charge by computer** to **Off** and reconnect the camera to the printer.

Notes About Multi-shot 16

Smear (\overleftrightarrow 3) visible in the monitor when shooting with **Multi-shot 16** enabled will be recorded with images. Avoiding bright objects such as the sun, reflections of the sun, and electric lights when shooting with **Multi-shot 16** enabled is recommended.

ISO Sensitivity





When the Charge Lamp Quickly Flashes Green

Charging cannot be performed, possibly due to one of the reasons described below.

- The ambient temperature is not suited to charging. Charge the battery indoors with an ambient temperature of 5°C to 35° C (41° F to 95° F).
- The USB cable is not connected correctly, or the battery is faulty. Make sure the USB cable is connected correctly and replace the battery if necessary.
- The computer is in sleep mode and is not supplying power. Wake up the computer.
- The battery cannot be charged because the computer cannot supply power to the camera due to the computer's settings or its specifications.



- Refer to the instruction manual of your Eye-Fi card for more information. In the event of malfunction, contact the card manufacturer.
- The camera can be used to turn Eye-Fi cards on and off, but may not support other Eye-Fi functions.
- The camera is not compatible with the Endless Memory function. When it is set on a computer, disable the function. If the Endless Memory function is enabled, the number of images taken may not be displayed correctly.
- Eye-Fi cards are for use only in the country of purchase. Observe all local laws concerning wireless devices.
- Leaving the setting as Enable will result in the battery being depleted in a shorter period of time.



Caring for the Product

The Camera

To ensure continued enjoyment of this Nikon product, observe the precautions described below in addition to the warnings in "For Your Safety" (\Box viii-x) when using or storing the device.

Keep Dry

The device will be damaged if immersed in water or subjected to high humidity.

Do Not Drop

The product may malfunction if subjected to strong shock or vibration.

Handle the Lens and All Moving Parts with Care

Do not apply force to the lens, lens cover, monitor, memory card slot, or battery chamber. These parts are easily damaged. Applying force to the lens cover could result in camera malfunction or damage to the lens. Should the monitor break, care should be taken to avoid injury caused by broken glass and to prevent the liquid crystal from the display touching the skin or entering the eyes or mouth.

V Do Not Point the Lens at Strong Light Sources for Extended Periods

Avoid pointing the lens at the sun or other strong light sources for extended periods when using or storing the camera. Intense light may cause deterioration of the CCD image sensor, producing a white blur effect in photographs.

Keep Away from Strong Magnetic Fields

Do not use or store this device in the vicinity of equipment that generates strong electromagnetic radiation or magnetic fields. Strong static charge or the magnetic fields produced by equipment such as radio transmitters could interfere with the monitor, damage data saved on the memory card, or affect the product's internal circuitry.



Avoid Sudden Changes in Temperature

Sudden changes in temperature, such as when entering or leaving a heated building on a cold day, can cause condensation to form inside the device. To prevent condensation, place the device in a carrying case or a plastic bag before exposing it to sudden changes in temperature.

V Turn the Product Off Before Removing or Disconnecting the Power Source or Memory Card

Do not remove the battery while the product is on, or while images are being saved or deleted. Forcibly cutting power in these circumstances could result in loss of data or in damage to product memory or internal circuitry.

Notes About the Monitor

- Monitors and electronic viewfinders are constructed with extremely high precision; at least 99.99%
 of pixels are effective, with no more than 0.01% being missing or defective. Hence while these
 displays may contain pixels that are always lit (white, red, blue, or green) or always off (black), this is
 not a malfunction and has no effect on images recorded with the device.
- White or colored streaks may be visible when bright subjects are framed in the monitor. This
 phenomenon, known as "smear," occurs when extremely bright light strikes the image sensor; it is
 characteristic of image sensors and does not indicate a malfunction. Smear may also take the form
 of partial discoloration in the monitor during shooting. It does not appear in images saved with
 the camera except in the cases of movies and of images saved with Multi-shot 16 selected for
 Continuous. When shooting in these modes, we recommend that you avoid bright subjects such
 as the sun, reflected sunlight, and electric lights.
- Images in the monitor may be difficult to see under bright lighting.
- The monitor is lit by an LED backlight. Should the monitor begin to dim or flicker, contact your Nikon-authorized service representative.

The Battery

Be sure to read and follow the warnings in "For Your Safety" (QViii-x) before use.

- Check the battery level before using the camera and replace or charge the battery if necessary. Do not continue charging once the battery is fully charged as this will result in reduced battery performance. Whenever possible, carry a fully charged spare battery when taking images on important occasions.
- Do not use the battery at ambient temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 40°C (104°F).
- Charge the battery indoors with an ambient temperature of 5°C to 35°C (41°F to 95°F) before use.
- When charging the battery inserted into this camera using the Charging AC Adapter or a computer, the battery is not charged at battery temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F).
- Note that the battery may become hot during use; wait for the battery to cool before charging. Failure to observe these precautions could damage the battery, impair its performance, or prevent it from charging normally.
- On cold days, the capacity of batteries tends to decrease. Be sure that the battery is fully charged before heading outside to take images in cold weather. Keep spare batteries in a warm place and exchange as necessary. Once warmed, a cold battery may recover some of its charge.
- Dirt on the battery terminals can prevent the camera from functioning. Should the battery terminals become dirty, wipe them off with a clean, dry cloth before use.
- If the battery will not be used for some time, insert it in the camera and completely exhaust it before removing it for storage. The battery should be stored in a cool location with an ambient temperature of 15°C to 25°C (59°F to 77°F). Do not store the battery in hot or extremely cold locations.
- Always remove the battery from the camera or optional battery charger when it is not being used. When inserted, minute amounts of current flow even when unused, and the battery may become excessively drained and no longer function. Turning the camera on or off while the battery is exhausted can result in reduced battery life.
- Recharge the battery at least once every six months and completely exhaust it before returning it to storage.
- After removing the battery from the camera or optional battery charger, put the battery in a plastic bag, etc. in order to insulate it and store it in a cool place.
- A marked drop in the time a fully charged battery retains its charge, when used at room temperature, indicates that the battery needs to be replaced. Purchase a new EN-EL19 battery.

Charging AC Adapter

Be sure to read and follow the warnings in "For Your Safety" (Quviii-x) before use.

- The Charging AC Adapter EH-70P is for use only with compatible devices. Do not use with another make or model of device.
- The EH-70P is compatible with AC 100-240 V, 50/60 Hz electrical outlets. When using in other countries, use a plug adapter (commercially available) as necessary. For more information about plug adapters, consult your travel agency.
- Do not, under any circumstances, use another make or model of AC adapter other than Charging AC Adapter EH-70P or USB-AC adapter. Failure to observe this precaution could result in overheating or in damage to the camera.

Memory Cards

- Use only Secure Digital memory cards. See "Approved Memory Cards" (20) for recommended memory cards.
- Be sure to follow the precautions described in the documentation included with the memory card.
- Do not put labels or stickers on memory cards.
- The first time you insert a memory card that has been used in another device into this camera, be sure to format it with this camera. We recommend formatting new memory cards with this camera before using them with this camera.
- Note that formatting a memory card permanently deletes all images and other data on the memory card. Be sure to make copies of any images you wish to keep before formatting the memory card.
- If the message Card is not formatted. Format card? is displayed when the camera is turned on, the memory card must be formatted. If there is data that you do not want to delete, select No. Copy the necessary data to a computer, etc. If you want to format the card, select Yes. The confirmation dialog will be displayed. To start formatting, press the ^(M) button.
- Do not perform the following during formatting, while data is being written to or deleted from the memory card, or during data transfer to a computer. Failure to observe this precaution could result in the loss of data or in damage to the camera or memory card:
 - Open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover to remove/insert the battery or memory card.
 - Turn off the camera.
 - Disconnect the AC adapter.
- Do not format the memory card using a computer.

Cleaning and Storage

Cleaning

Do not use alcohol, thinner, or other volatile chemicals.

Lens	Avoid touching the lens with your fingers. Remove dust or lint with a blower (typically a small device with a rubber bulb attached to one end that is pumped to produce a stream of air out the other end). To remove fingerprints or other stains that cannot be removed with a blower, wipe the lens with a soft cloth, using a spiral motion that starts at the center of them and working toward the edges. If this fails, clean the lens using a cloth lightly dampened with commercial lens cleaner.
Monitor	Remove dust or lint with a blower. To remove fingerprints and other stains, clean the monitor with a soft, dry cloth, being careful not to apply pressure.
Body	Use a blower to remove dust, dirt, or sand, then wipe gently with a soft, dry cloth. After using the camera at the beach or other sandy or dusty environment, wipe off any sand, dust, or salt with a dry cloth lightly dampened with fresh water and dry thoroughly. Note that foreign matter inside the camera could cause damage not covered by the warranty.

Storage

Turn the camera off when not in use. Be sure that the power-on lamp is off before putting the camera away. Remove the battery if the camera will not be used for an extended period. Do not store the camera with naphtha or camphor moth balls, or in any of the following locations:

- Next to equipment that produces strong electromagnetic fields, such as televisions or radios
- Exposed to temperatures below −10°C (14°F) or above 50°C (122°F)
- Places that are poorly ventilated or subject to humidity of over 60%

To prevent mold or mildew, take the camera out of storage at least once a month. Turn the camera on and release the shutter a few times before putting the camera away again. For storing the battery, follow the precautions in "The Battery" (24) in "Caring for the Product" (26).
